Hazard Mitigation Funding Available

The notice of funding opportunity was just released for the first year of FEMA's new annual mitigation funding program, [Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities \(BRIC\)](#) along with the notice for the annual [Flood Mitigation Assistance \(FMA\)](#) program. The new BRIC program replaces what was previously the Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) grant program.

With this new program, FEMA is focusing on innovative, collaborative projects and nature-based solutions. This includes funding for Project Scoping (previously Advanced Assistance), which is a benefit to communities that have a known hazard but lack funding for an alternatives analysis and to develop a Benefit-Cost Analysis (BCA).

For both programs, the application period opens September 30, 2020 with a state deadline of **January 6, 2021**.

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC):

- **Eligible Applicants:** State agencies, Regional Planning Commissions, and municipalities. Note: FEMA is pushing public-private partnerships and prioritizing funding for those projects which identify collaboration with private entities (to include non-profit organizations, academic institutions, businesses, etc.). So, if you represent, for example, a non-profit organization with a really good project in mind, we will need to team you up with a governmental "sponsor" to act as sub-applicant. Municipalities must have an approved Local Hazard Mitigation Plan at the time of application submittal.
- **Funding Available:** \$600,000 (federal share) set-aside for Vermont with up to \$300,000 available for planning activities. Up to \$50 million is available per sub-application for nationally competitive mitigation projects.
- **Eligible Projects:** Everything that was previously eligible under PDM will still be

eligible, e.g. home buyouts, culvert projects, Local Hazard Mitigation Planning grants, etc. In addition, under BRIC, applicants can apply for:

- Project Scoping (previously called Advanced Assistance)
- Capability- and capacity-building activities
- Non-financial direct technical assistance
- **Management Costs:** 5% of total project costs will be available to sub-applicants for managing the grant award.
- **Cost Share:** 75% federal, 25% local non-federal (cash and/or in-kind); up to 90% federal share for small, impoverished communities.

Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA):

- FMA funds must benefit an NFIP-participating community; ideally those with Repetitive Loss/ Severe Repetitive Loss properties.
- Up to \$600,000 is available per State for Project Scoping to develop community flood mitigation projects that reduce future NFIP flood claims.
- Up to \$30 million can be applied for per sub-applicant for Community Flood Mitigation Projects to address community flood risk to reduce future NFIP flood claims.
- Cost Share: 75% federal, 25% local non-federal (cash and/or in-kind); or up to 90% for Repetitive-Loss and up to 100% for Severe-Repetitive Loss properties.

Emergency Preparedness Month

Emergency responders dedicate their lives to helping others. But despite their best efforts, they are often stretched thin during a widespread disaster. That's why individuals need to prepare to help themselves for at least part of a disaster.

September is Preparedness Month, which serves as an opportunity for responders to communicate with the public about the need for self-preparation. Individuals and families need to take steps to go it alone if weather conditions prevent them from leaving home or responders to reach them.

Preparing for a disaster has become a slightly more complicated exercise during COVID-19. Communities must account for social distancing and masks when setting up emergency shelters, families need to add extra face coverings to their preparedness kits, and staying with friends or family after being displaced may not be an option for some.

The Ready campaign ([ready.gov](https://www.ready.gov)) offers a number of resources for the public, and outreach materials for responders, municipal leaders, state agencies, or others. This year's themes are:

Week 1 September 1-5: Make A Plan

Talk to your friends and family about how you will communicate before, during, and after a disaster. Make sure to update your plan based on the Centers for Disease Control recommendations due to the coronavirus.

Week 2 September 6-12: Build A Kit

Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Don't forget to consider the unique needs each person or pet may have in case you have to evacuate quickly. Update your kits and supplies based on recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control.

Week 3 September 13-19: Prepare for Disasters

Limit the impacts that disasters have on you and your family. Know the risk of disasters in your area and check your insurance coverage. Learn how to make your home stronger in the face of storms and other common hazards and act fast if you receive a local warning or alert.

Week 4 September 20-26: Teach Youth About Preparedness

Talk to your kids about preparing for emergencies and what to do in case you are separated. Reassure them by providing information about how they can get involved.
